**Jeramiah Lamb**

Jeremiah Lamb was born in the early 1800 to Jeremiah and Mary (Price) Lamb. There is no record of the birth and the 1880 Goodspeed history of Osage county on George Washington Pointer notes that he was born in Mississippi. However much of the census information from his children notes he was born in TN and I assume this to be correct.

We find the first record of Jeremiah Lamb in the 1830 census of Campbell County Kentucky. This is the area around Covington, south of Cincinnati, Ohio. He is living next to Issac David who is the father of

Nancy his wife. It notes that there are two girls under five; however we have only records of one, Mary Ann.

There are no marriage records for the Lamb - David marriage in Campbell County register, which is well documented from the late 1700 or so it is possible they were married prior to moving to Campbell County.

In the 1840 census we find Jeremiah still in Campbell County and Isaac David living next door. The census also shows two additional children, I do not have names for.

I also have a note from a Craig Beeman that Jeremiah moved to Osage county in 1843 and died in 1844 (this date is also noted in the Goodspeed History of Osage County) and is buried in Feuers Cemetery. This cemetery is located on County Road 727 South of State highway D, west of Coppers Hill in Osage County Mo. There currently are no records to back this up.

**Nancy Ellen David**

Nancy David was born in Virginia about 1802; she is the daughter of Isaac David and unknown.

In 1830 we find Nancy is married and recorded with husband Jeremiah and two girls under five years old. They are living next to her father Isaac who has three women (Nancy's sisters?) in the household. Campbell County marriage records are available and there is no record of the Lamb David wedding. It is possible they were married in Virginia and the migrated to Kentucky about 1825.

The next record we have of Nancy is the 1850 census for Crawford Township, Osage County, Missouri. She is living in a household with her father and five children. Jeremiah (husband) has died. Crawford Township is in the area east of Linn near Highway 89 and 50. The census notes that she was born in Virginia and all of her children were born in Tennessee. It also notes that she cannot read or write.

There is no record of Nancy in the 1860 census.

We find Nancy in the 1870 census for Jefferson Township, Osage County Missouri. She is living by herself in a household with a real estate value of \$850.00. She is living next to a family of George David, age 41, who has a 10 year old son, Issac. It is my assumption that this is a nephew. (No bother of that age see 1830 Campbell County KY Census)

Nancy shows up in the Missouri State Census of 1876 again in Jefferson Township, Osage County Missouri. From the look of the census George David is living in her household. She owns 1 horse, four sheep and produced 30 Bushels of Wheat and 100 Bushels of corn.

The 1880 Census fins Nancy 78 years old and in her daughter, Margaret Lamb Pointers Household. It notes she is at home and was born in Virginia as both of her parents were.

Nancy died in 1884 Burial unknown.

---

**Margaret Elizabeth Lamb**

Margaret E. Lamb was born on October 22, 1842 near Nashville, Davidson County, Tennessee. She is the daughter of Jeramiah Lamb and Nancy Ellen David.

On March 17, 1859 she married George Washington Pointer, son of James and Nancy (Branson) Pointer. In this year they also moved into a house near the College Hill Baptist Church. The farm was 110 acres of

which 50 acres were under cultivation. They also raised stock. It was in this house they would live and raise 13 children over the next 60 years. The house was still standing, in poor repair in 1985.

During the Civil War rebel forces did reach as far as the G.W Pointer farm while George was away. Margaret jumped on a horse and with her daughter galloping off as the forces shot at her. She escaped to a relative home. It is said that there were still rebel bullets embedded in the logs of the house.

The 1850 Census for Crawford Township Osage county finds Margaret 8 years old and living with her mother and sisters and brothers. Her father is dead but her mother father, Isaac David is living with them. Only two pages away are the James Pointer family and George is 9 years old. They were neighbors and they probably met when growing up. Prior to 1860 James Pointer family relocated to a farm in Jefferson Township.

There are no records for Margaret and George in the 1860 Census.

The 1870 Census find her living on the farm, keeping house and with five children. This census also notes the she can read but cannot write.

In 1880 census we find the couple with 8 children and Margaret's mother, Nancy (David) Lamb, was also living with them. It also noted that he could read and but could not write.

By the 1900 census George and Margaret have three children remaining at home. It noted that George and Margaret has been married 41years and 12 of their 13 children were living. It also notes that she can read, speak English but cannot write. Also it says she was born in Tennessee and He father was born in Mississippi and mother in Virginia

The 1910 census find all children gone in this their 51st year of marriage; however two grandchildren Era (age 11) and Josephine (age 7) Hassler are now living with them. Three daughters married Hasslers so at this time we do not know which daughter's children these are.

The 1920 Census find George and Margaret living on the farm alone. He is 80 and she is 79. They have lived on the farm for 60 years with no electricity and only a pump for water and raised 13 children. Life must have been very challenging at times.

Margaret died in March 8, 1920. She was at the home of a daughter in Belle so her death is recorded in Maries county She was buried at the Becker cemetery on property owned by Sara Bacon in the 1985. The cemetery was in poor shape and George's stone was missing in 1985. Margaret's stone was still present at that time.

George and Margaret were prominent people in Osage county and the following Biographical sketch appeared in Godspeed History of Osage county published in 1889. The article notes that Mrs. Pointer was a member of the Baptist Church.

George W. Pointer is a son of James and Nancy (Branson) Pointer, Of whose family of eleven children six are now living. James Pointer was born in Franklin County, Mo., in 1815, and is one of the pioneer settlers of Osage County, in which county he is still living. His wife, Nancy Pointer, who is a native of Tennessee, was born in 1.817. The paternal grandfather of our subject was George Pointer, who immigrated from Kentucky to Missouri while the' Indians claimed possession of the interior counties. He died in Osage County, Mo., about 1825.

George W. Pointer was born in Osage County in 1839, and was reared on a farm, attending the common schools of the county until about nineteen years of age. March 17, 1859, he married Margaret Lamb, who was born near Nashville, Tenn., October 22, 1842,

and is a daughter of Jeremiah and Nancy Lamb, natives respectively of Mississippi and Virginia, who settled in Osage County, Mo., in 1843, where the father died in 1844 and the mother in 1884.

The following children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Pointer:

Catherine, who married James Jett, and died in 1884, leaving two children; Franz Siegel, Bettie, wife of James L. Vaughn; Errena T., Flora Isabelle, Charles M., Louisa R., Mary M., James C., Nora S., Lorenzo B., Martha L. and Antonia C.

In 1860 Mr. Pointer removed to his present home in Jefferson Township, Osage County, twelve miles southeast of Linn, where he owns a farm of 110 acres, fifty-eight acres of which are under cultivation. He is engaged in farming and stock-raising, and has been very successful at his chosen occupation.

He was a member of the Missouri State Militia during the late war, and December 6, 1866, he was commissioned by Gov. Fletcher first lieutenant of Company D, Ninth Battalion.

Mrs. Pointer is a member of the Baptist Church.
